Advice For New Teachers and Soon To Be Teachers

I have officially put my name into the group of art educators that I would call the "Oldies But Goodies" (LOL) or maybe the "Seasoned Art Veterans." I never imagined I'd be in any career for 25+ years. Time sure flies by; so I think this would be a great point in any art teacher's life that we should look at the need to mentor the new members of the MAEA, though I know most of us already do this. So here it goes, this is my top 10 suggestions or pieces of advice for the "newbies."

- **1.** Have confidence in yourself. I remember my first year; I wasn't a "super teacher." I was a part time teacher and I kept my job at the grocery store because I had benefits through them that made me feel secure. Just remember you were offered the job because they see something in you that you might not see yet. Trust yourself.
- 2. Build relationships, Student to Teacher. They are not your friends they are your students.
- **3.** Make friends with your peers. Along with the other teachers, don't forget your secretaries and custodians. These are the people who will be there for you if you are in need of help. I was so sad last year when a daytime head custodian retired; Doug was my third hand. It did not matter what I needed he was always there.
- **4.** Prepare yourself; make samples ahead of time. Your students can see the end result along with demonstrating the steps it takes to get to the end result.
- **5.** Do not think you can treat all of your students the same. Every student deserves to be treated as an individual. Just as not wanting to treat the students the same, you as a teacher should not want to try to copy your mentoring teacher. You too are an individual.
- 6. Always have a backup plan, whether it's for early finishers or unplanned times when you need a sub.
- **7.** Do not forget to be involved with the community. You will find out that community support can play a very positive factor in the "give and take" that can help strengthen and grow your program.
- **8.** Keep good records of all the extra things that you do throughout the year. All of the extras can help you secure your job when they know how important those things are.
- 9. Don't forget about three-dimensional artwork. There are so many cool ideas out there and in your own creative mind.
- **10.** Be flexible but do not let yourself get run over. You know what I mean.

I hope this will help at least one person. That is Tami's two cents.





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
